Ms. Kathy Chambers, Moore & Associates, reviewed the Transportation Development Act Triennial Performance Audits for Ventura County TDA claimants. She said that she can update reports until June 16, 2017. Ms. Chambers reviewed local and national trends regarding findings, the functional and compliance findings, recommendations, and tips for preparing for the next Triennial Performance Audit.

Ms. Chambers reviewed the findings specific to Ventura County Transportation Commission as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) as follows:

- 1) Update the rules and regulations for the evaluation of claims,
- 2) Upload the updated Ventura County Congestion Management Program to the VCTC website,
- 3) Work with the East County Transit Alliance to complete operating data on an annual basis, and
- 4) Develop a policy for transit operators servicing rural and urbanized areas (such as Ojai) that considers a blended farebox recovery ratio goal.

Discussion

The Committee discussed 1) the changes to local transit agencies since the last audit, 2) the

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importance of establishing baseline data, 3) the benefit of sharing best practices and strategies on a regular basis at future TRANSCOM meetings.

ACTION:

County Transportation Commission to submit the State required Transportation
Development Act (TDA) triennial performance audits of TDA recipients in Ventura
County to the State Department of Transportation (Caltrans) by June 30, 2017. The

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Committee approve for the Commission's consideration:

- the attached Guidelines for a Call-for-Projects to program FTA Section 5310 Large Urbanized Area (Seniors and Disabled) funds and Section 5307 Jobs Access/Reverse Commute (JARC) funds, and
- the proposed Call-for-Projects Schedule.

BACKGROUND:

The Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Section 5310 Grant program is intended to enhance mobility for seniors and persons with disabilities by providing funds that support the special needs of seniors beyond traditional public transportation services and for those with disabilities beyond that required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

The goal of the JARC program is to improve access to employment and employment related activities for eligible low-income individuals and to transport residents of urbanized areas and non-urbanized areas to suburban employment opportunities.

Both the FTA Section 5310 funds and JARC funds are the primary funding source to support projects and strategies identified in VCTC's Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Plan which can be found at: https://www.goventura.org/updated-ventura-county-coordinated-public-transit-human-services-transportation-plan.

Section 5310 funds are apportioned directly to large urbanized areas including Oxnard/Ventura and Thousand Oaks/Moorpark. VCTC serves as the Designated Recipient for these funds as well as JARC funds for these areas. Funds are allocated by VCTC on a competitive basis through a Call for Projects.

DISCUSSION:

<u>Funding Availability Estimates</u>: The following table shows the Section 5310 and JARC funds available for the two large urbanized areas in Ventura County for FY16/17 and 17/18, including prior year carryover. Section 5310 allows 10% of the apportionment to be used for administration and this amount has been subtracted from the Section 5310 amounts shown below.

VCTC 2017 CALL-FOR-PROJECTS (2 YEARS) FOR SECTION 5310 LARGE URBANIZED AREA FUNDS AND SECTION 5307 JOBS ACCESS/REVERSE COMMUTE (JARC) FUNDS

Program Purpose: The Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Section 5310 Grant program is intended to enhance mobility for seniors and persons with disabilities by providing funds that support the special needs of seniors beyond traditional public transportation services and for those with disabilities beyond that required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

The goal of the JARC program is to improve access to employment and employment related activities for eligible low-income individuals and to transport residents of urbanized areas and non-urbanized areas to suburban employment opportunities.

Purpose of this Call-for-Projects: This is the primary funding source to support projects and strategies identified in VCTC'S COORDINATED PUBLIC TRANSIT-HUMAN SERVICES PLAN which can be found at: https://www.goventura.org/updated-ventura-county-coordinated-public-transit-human-services-transportation-plan.

The FTA 5310 program provides grant funds for capital, mobility management, and operating expenses for:

- Public transportation projects planned, designed, and carried out to meet the special needs of seniors and individuals with disabilities when public transportation is insufficient, inappropriate, or unavailable;
- Public transportation projects that exceed the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA);
- Public transportation projects that improve access to fixed-route service and decrease reliance on complementary paratransit; and
- Alternatives to public transportation projects that assist seniors and individuals with disabilities and with transportation.

JARC funds provide financial assistance for transportation service planned, designed, and carried out to meet the transportation needs of eligible low-income individuals.

SCREENING CRITERIA

The screening criteria are divided into three categories. Proposed projects must meet **all** of these screening criteria in order to move to the next phase of the process.

- **1. Project Eligibility:** The proposed project and applicant must be eligible to receive either Section 5310 funds or JARC funds.
- **2. Planning Consistency:** The project must fall within the recommendations of VCTC'S Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Plan.

3. Financial Feasibility:

- A. Recipient of funds must have the financial capacity to complete, operate and maintain the project.
- B. Funds required from other sources (for local match) must be reasonably expected to be available.
- C. Projects must be implemented within Federal delivery requirements.

Eligible Recipients: States and designated recipients are direct recipients; eligible subrecipients include private nonprofit organizations, states or local government authorities, or operators of public transportation. Since the JARC program has been consolidated with the Section 5307 formula program for transit operators, VCTC's policy is that applicants for JARC be limited to entities other than Ventura County transit operators that normally receive 5307 funds.

Eligible Activities:

Traditional Section 5310 project examples include:

- buses and vans
- wheelchair lifts, ramps, and securement devices
- transit-related information technology systems, including scheduling/routing/onecall systems
- mobility management programs which can include travel training and volunteer driver programs
- acquisition of transportation services under a contract, lease, or other arrangement

Nontraditional Section 5310 project examples include:

- travel training
- volunteer driver programs
- building an accessible path to a bus stop, including curb-cuts, sidewalks, accessible pedestrian signals or other accessible features
- improving signage, or way-finding technology
- incremental cost of providing same day service or door-to-door service
- purchasing vehicles to support new accessible taxi, rides sharing and/or vanpooling programs
- mobility management programs

<u>JARC project examples include:</u>

- projects designed to transport low-income persons or welfare recipients to jobs and employment-related activities.
- projects designed to transport workers to suburban employment opportunities.

At least 55% of the area's 5310 funds must be used on capital projects as described in the first category of Section 5310 projects above.

Match Requirements: A local match is not required, however five (5) points will be awarded to projects which provide a minimum of twenty percent (20%) matching funds.

Inclusion in Plan: Project must fall within the recommendations of the VCTC Human Service Transportation Coordination Plan: https://www.goventura.org/updated-ventura-county-coordinated-public-transit-human-services-transportation-plan.

Federal Grant Requirements: The recipient agency must be able to meet the Federal Transit Administration's conditions for use of its funds. These conditions include, but are not limited to: annual outside audit; triennial FTA audit; five-year grant records retention; development of a written maintenance plan for FTA-funded vehicles, facilities, and equipment; competitive procurement; buy America; ADA; and civil rights. (Drug and alcohol testing is not a requirement for these programs.) Agencies receiving funds will need to have in place a signed agreement committing to meeting FTA requirements.

Prioritization Criteria:

One-Call / One-Click Set-Aside: The Human Service Transportation Coordination Plan identified as a very high priority the need for improved and simplified human service transportation information, specifically through development of the One-Call / One-Click capability. Therefore, VCTC has approved a policy for this call for projects whereby \$100,000 of Section 5310 funds will be set aside specifically for projects that help to develop One-Call / One-Click informational capability for Ventura County, defined as projects that will provide integrated call center and online information regarding demand responsive transportation alternatives. Projects that fall under this category will be scored by the same criteria as all other projects, but they will not be ranked against these projects but rather will be prioritized in a separate category and eligible to compete for the \$100,000 being set aside for this category. In recommending the projects for funding from this category, VCTC will take into consideration the avoidance of duplicatory efforts. The intent is that the funds will be used for the project or projects that can without duplicating efforts provide the best One-Stop / One-Click informational capability for Ventura County.

VCTC will use the following criteria to prioritize projects.

- 1. **Goals and Objectives (20 points)**: Degree to which project supports new, enhancement, or expansion of service or system capacity for the targeted populations. The application should clearly state the program goals and objectives and describe how the project addresses the needs and service gaps identified in the Coordinated Plan.
- 2. **Project Implementation Plan (30 points)**: Degree to which the project implementation has been well designed. Proposals must state who will be responsible for the implementation, and implementation steps and timeline. Sponsors should describe how the project will improve service delivery, coordination, or cost-effectiveness.
- 3. **Program Performance Indicators (20 points)**: Project sponsors should explain how the project will be monitored and evaluated. The application should identify clear, quantitative performance measures to track the effectiveness of the service in meeting the identified goals.
- **Communication and Outreach (20 points)**: Degree to which applicants 4. coordinate with other community transportation and/or social service resources. Application should describe efforts to keep stakeholders involved in and informed of project activities. There should be demonstrated public support for the project (including letters of support), as well as a plan to promote awareness of the project to the target population.
- 5. **Emergency Planning and Preparedness (5 points)**: Applicant should describe emergency planning and any participation in emergency drills.
- 6. **Matching Funds (5 points):** A maximum of 5 points will be awarded to projects providing 20% or more funding match.

SUBJECT: APPROVE 2017/18 FINAL PROGRAM OF PROJECTS

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the final Program of Projects (POP) for federal transit operating, planning and capital assistance for Fiscal Year (FY) 2017/18.

BACKGROUND

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) requires that the public be provided an opportunity to review transit projects proposed to be funded with federal dollars. As the designated recipient of federal transit funds, the VCTC is required to hold a public hearing and adopt a POP which lists projects to be funded with federal funds in each urban areas of Ventura County. Since 2003, VCTC has prepared the POP using separate programs for the Oxnard/Ventura, Thousand Oaks/Moorpark, and Camarillo urbanized areas, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau. Later, VCTC also began to prepare the POP for Simi Valley based on a decision by Caltrans to delegate to VCTC the Designated Recipient status for Simi Valley.

The proposed FY 2017/18 POP was put together using the same methodology that was first developed for the FY 2003/04 POP, to provide a distribution of revenues and expenses between the four urbanized areas in the County. A draft of this POP was reviewed and approved by TRANSCOM at its May, 2017 meeting, and by the VCTC on June 2, 2017.

DISCUSSION

The attached Program of Projects table shows the recommended projects for each of the urbanized areas. The only change between the draft and final POPs is the addition of CMAQ funds that were approved off-the-top at the April TRANSCOM meeting for VCTC Countywide Outreach and for Thousand Oaks bus purchases.

As was stated at the May meeting, VCTC will prepare a revised POP after projects are selected for the Section 5310 and JARC programs. The unprogrammed balances in the POP represent the 5307 funds generated through the JARC formula that are available for that program, as well as a small carryover that is available for contingency. The estimated available funds are based on the authorized amounts which are subject to the annual federal budget process. The Administration's proposed 2017/18 budget is equal to the authorized amounts for these funds.

Subsequent to the TRANSCOM meeting, staff will publish the POP for public notice, and will present the POP to the VCTC for Public Hearing and approval at the September 8th meeting.

Program of Projects

The Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) will hold a public hearing on the Program of Projects (POP) for the Oxnard, Thousand Oaks, Camarillo and Simi Valley Urbanized Areas (UAs) for projects to be funded with Federal Transit Administration funds in the 2017/18 Fiscal Year (FY 2018). The funds available in FY 2018 are estimated to be \$15,965,000 for the Oxnard UA, \$7,605,000 for the Thousand Oaks UA. \$2,435,000 for the Camarillo UA, and \$2,902,000 for the Simi Valley UA, based on anticipated FY 2018 funds, prior year carry-over funds, and federal discretionary funds. The public hearing will be held at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, September 8, 2017, in the Camarillo City Council Chamber, 601 Carmen Drive, in Camarillo. The POP is available for public inspection at 950 County Square Drive, Suite 207, Ventura CA 93003. Unless a subsequent list is published, this list will become the final Program of Projects for inclusion in the Southern California Association of Governments Federal Transportation Improvement Program.

SUBJECT: UPDATE ON SENATE BILL 1 – IMPLEMENTATION

RECOMMENDATION:

Information Only

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:

The Road Repair and Accountability ACT (Senate Bill 1) will provide more than \$760 million annually in new funding for transit projects statewide. Senate Bill 1 Funds will support the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP), the State Transit Assistance (STA) Program, and the Commuter Rail and Intercity Rail Program. Additionally, transit components of multimodal corridor projects are also eligible for funding under the Solutions for Congested Corridors Program and the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). It should also be noted that SB 862 "Cap and Trade" also provides funding for transit projects under the TIRCP program and Low Carbon Transit Operations Program (LCTOP). An overview of these funding programs and the upcoming opportunities for input into program guidelines is provided below:

Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP)

- SB1 funding directed to TIRCP will be approximately \$3 billion over the next decade.
- TIRCP is a competitive Program -- Call-for-Projects planned to be issued in December
- Program goals include the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, expanded and improved rail and transit service to increase ridership, the integration of different rail and transit systems, and improved transit safety
- Five (5) year of Program of Projects will be adopted with future Calls-for-Projects to be issued every two years thereafter -- \$1.5B \$2B (SB1 and SB 862)
- The first cycle is expected to include 2-years of funding (\$125 million).
- Will include multi-year funding agreements with multiple allocations
- NEXT STEPS CalSTA will:
- release the Discussion Draft Guidelines & hold additional workshops –July

- Release Formal Draft Guidelines & Hold additional workshops –August
- Adopt Final Guidelines September
- Project Awards Spring of 2018

STA—State of Good Repair

- \$105 million annually formula program
- Transit Agencies are required to submit a list of projects to Caltrans and Caltrans will
 forward the list to the State Controller for allocation according to the STA formula
 (population and transit agency revenue)
- Funds will be allocated quarterly by the Controller starting in early 2018
- Funds can only be used for:
 - Capital expenditures to maintain the existing fleet & facilities,
 - o Purchase of new vehicles to improve service, or
 - Transit services that complement repair and improvement of local transportation infrastructure.
- Guidelines will establish a timeline and submission requirements for project eligibility including: description and location; completion date; and useful life
- Guidelines will define post-project reporting requirements
- Caltrans is considering using the PTMISEA program model to administer this program

LCTOP

- Focus of the program is to improve transit service in communities across the state
- Funded with Cap and Trade auction proceeds
- Current budget forecast would provide about \$64 million for allocations in 2017-18
- LCTOP guidelines will incorporate new Air Resources Board guidance for disadvantaged communities, per AB 1550
- LCTOP staff will be holding workshops for input regarding guidelines
- Next Call-for-Projects Spring 2018

SOLUTIONS FOR CONGESTED CORRIDORS

- \$250 Million per year
- Eligible Applicants VCTC, Caltrans—The CTC would like projects to be collaborative-Caltrans cannot nominate more than 50% of the projects on their own.
- Projects can <u>only</u> come from a qualified integrated Corridor Plan. A variety of funding sources (SHOPP, ATP, Freight, and Congested Corridors) can be used for implementation.
- Qualified Plans provide a multi-modal approach to addressing Congested Corridors.
